 - 3. Which river is the longest in North America?
 - 4. Which river is the longest in the world?



Facts about Mississippi River

- 1. The Mississippi River is one of the longest rivers in the world.
- 2. The Mississippi River is the longest river in North America, flowing 2320 miles (3733 km).
- 3. The Mississippi River's source is at Lake Itasca in the Minnesota North Woods; its mouth is at subtropical Louisiana Delta, Gulf of Mexico.
- 4. "Mississippi" is an Ojibwa (Chippewa) Indian word meaning great river or gathering of waters.
- 5. The Mississippi River runs through 10 states in U.S. and one province in Canada: Arkansas, Illinois, Iowa, Kentucky, Louisiana, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Tennessee, Wisconsin, and Ontario.
