Length: 3 to 5 pages, double-spaced in 12-point font

Topic: Write a paper in which you critique the documentary film, *The Emperor's Eye: Art and Power in Industrial China*. The documentary is available for streaming through the Films on Demand database in the Lehman Library: [SHIP PERMALINK](#).

The critique should summarize the content of the film with special attention to its portrayal of the Emperor Qianlong's role in collecting the works of art that presently fill the Palace Museums of Beijing, China and Taipei, Taiwan. The critique should evaluate the film's 1) *historical accuracy* depicting facts related to Qianlong's life and 2) *historical interpretation* of Qianlong's qualities as a ruler and art collector. The film's aesthetic or entertainment value should not be a major focus.

Your main sources for evaluating the film should be Mark Elliott, *Emperor Qianlong*, Jonathan Spence, *The Search for Modern China*, and class lectures. Additional research in library sources is allowed, but not necessary. NO INTERNET SITES ARE ALLOWED UNLESS LEHMAN LIBRARY PROVIDES DATABASE LINKS. Cite all sources in proper Chicago A or B format. Non-history majors may use MLA.

Evaluation of Papers:

80% of the grade will be based on content. Grades of A will be awarded to papers with accurate summaries of the film and persuasive argumentation critiquing the *historical accuracy* and *historical interpretation* of the film. The other 20% will be based upon grammar and word usage (4%), spelling, capitalization and punctuation (4%), organization (4%), readability (4%), and bibliography and citations (4%).
